Results for the September quarter 2021 feedlot survey

Summary

- Cattle on feed numbers declined slightly across the September quarter, reported at 1,119,093 head, an increase of 10.8% on the year-ago levels.
- The number of cattle on feed are 10% higher the five-year September average.
- National feedlot capacity remained firm on June 2021 levels, to 1,447,716 head – demonstrating the continued confidence of the feeding industry.
- Most states decreased slightly in the September quarter with WA experiencing the largest % decline by 24%.

From the previous quarter:

- NSW and QLD both experienced slight decreases of 302,369 and 690,229 head, down 6.9% and 2.6% respectively.
- SA and Victoria remained steady reporting 36,327 head and 61,334 cattle on feed respectively.
- The national feedlot utilisation decreased to 77% for the September quarter, equal to the five-year September average. WA experienced the largest decrease of 13%, with NSW and QLD falling 6% and 2% respectively to 73% and 83%. Victoria and SA declined 4% and 1% respectively hitting 78% and 68%.

Figure 1: Cattle on feed




Figure 2: Quarterly grainfed beef exports



Currency

- In the September quarter, the A\$ averaged US73.5¢, lower than the previous quarter and 2.8% higher year-on-year.
- Against the Japanese Yen, the A\$ increased 6.6% from the September 2021 quarter to average 80.92¥ in the September quarter this year.
- Against the Korean Won, the A\$ averaged 851.89₩, a minute increase on year ago levels, up by 0.3%.

Grainfed exports

- Australian grainfed exports increased 7% in the September quarter to 81,812 tonnes shipped weight (swt), up 19% from the September 2020 quarter.
- Japan continued to be Australia's largest export market for grainfed beef, with volumes exported reaching 33612 tonnes swt, up 10% on the September 2020 quarter.
- Korea still just surpasses China in volume of grainfed exports in the September quarter, up 11% on the previous quarter to 18,192 tonnes swt. Exports to China also reported a slight increase, up 7% on the June quarter to 17,228 tonnes swt, up 35% on the same quarter last year.

Figure 3: Grainfed cattle turn-off




Figure 4: Feed grain and feeder steer prices




Figure 5: Queensland 100-day Grainfed Steer OTH Indicator



Domestic feeder cattle prices

- The Queensland 100 day grainfed steer over-the-hook (OTH) indicator continued to trade at record levels, averaging 694¢/kg carcase weight (cwt) in the September quarter, 2.5% higher than the June quarter levels and 7% above year-ago levels. The ongoing herd rebuild limited the supply of finished cattle, resulting in higher OTH prices across the board.
- The national feeder steer indicator averaged 497¢/kg live weight (lwt) in the September quarter, an increase of 12.4% on the previous quarter. The indicator held a steady increase through the quarter as a direct result of continuing restocker competition and need to acquire supply, continuing to launch into record territory. Up 29% on year ago levels.

Grain prices

■ In the September quarter wheat ex-Darling Downs prices increased, up 7% from the previous quarter to average \$333/tonne. These prices are 1.5% below September 2020 levels. Barley averaged \$293/tonne, up 2.8% on the previous quarter and 1.3% below year-ago levels.
