



Lot feeding brief

Results for the September quarter 2020 feedlot survey

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■ Cattle on feed numbers remained stable in the September 2020 quarter, reported at 1,010,320 head, a 10% decline on year-ago levels.

Despite numbers easing throughout 2020, numbers on feed remain in line with the five-year average for the September quarter.

■ National feedlot capacity reached a new record, increasing slightly from the June quarter to 1,449,200 head, demonstrating the continued industry confidence in the lot feeding sector.

■ New South Wales cattle on feed increased 12% from the previous quarter to 295,752 head with Western Australia numbers increasing 2% to 37,938 head.

■ Cattle on feed in Queensland eased by 3% in the September quarter to 591,664 head, with numbers in Victoria and South Australia declining by 18% and 7% to 46,963 and 38,003 head, respectively.

■ National feedlot utilisation remained steady in the September quarter at 70%, however his was below year-ago levels. New South Wales and Western Australia were the only two states to report increased utilisation, up 8% and 2%, respectively. Victoria reported the largest decline in feedlot utilisation, back 13% on the June quarter, while Queensland and South Australia declined 5% and 4%, respectively.

Figure 1: Cattle on feed




Figure 2: Quarterly grainfed beef exports

Australian grainfed exports declined 12% in the September quarter to 68,590 tonnes shipped weight (swt), a decline of 16% on year-ago levels.

■ Japan continued to be Australia's largest export market for grainfed beef, however volumes eased 15% from the June quarter to 30,438 tonnes swt, 14% below September 2019 levels.

■ Korea surpassed China in volume of grainfed exports in the September quarter, increasing 1% on the previous quarter to 14,467 tonnes swt, 4% higher year-on-year. Exports to China reported a significant decline in the September quarter, back 35% to 12,717 tonnes swt, sitting 36% below year-ago levels.

■ The Queensland 100 day grainfed steer over-the-hook (OTH) indicator continued to trade at elevated levels, averaging 649¢/kg carcase weight (cwt) in the September quarter, 6% higher than the June quarter and 10% above year-ago levels. Despite increased store competition from restocker buyers as producer intentions shift towards a herd rebuild, continued demand for finished cattle supported prices through the quarter.




Figure 4: Feed grain and feeder steer prices

■ The national feeder steer indicator averaged 395¢/kg live weight (lwt) in the September quarter, an increase of 4% on the previous quarter. The indicator declined in the first half of the quarter as a result of strong restocker competition, before feeder buyers gained momentum during August, increasing to close the quarter 5¢ above where it opened, at 406¢/kg lwt.

■ Wheat ex-Darling Downs eased 21% from the June quarter to average \$338/tonne in the September quarter, sitting 16% below September 2019 levels, while barley averaged \$298/tonne, a decline of 18% on the previous quarter and 25% below year-ago levels.

■ The significant dip in grain prices has helped maintain margins across the lot feeding sector, despite an increase in feeder prices.
