# **Results for the March quarter 2021 feedlot survey**

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# Summary

■ The number of cattle on feed declined slightly in the March quarter and 7.6% on year-ago levels, reported at 1,005,035 head.

■ The number of cattle on feed for the March quarter is 3% below the five-year quarter average.

■ National feedlot capacity rose slightly from the record December quarter levels to 1,450,482 head – demonstrating continued confidence of the lot feeding industry.

#### From the previous quarter:


■ Queensland cattle on feed decreased by 8% to 542,176 head.

- SA cattle on feed declined 13% to 36,526 head.
- Cattle on feed numbers in WA increased by 22% to 56,782 head.

■ NSW remained steady, reporting 311,957 head cattle on feed, a change of -0.7%.

- Victoria also held firm, increasing by 1.4% to 57,594 head.
- National feedlot utilisation declined slightly to 69%, well below the five-year quarter average of 80%.

# Currency

In the March quarter, the A\$ averaged US77¢, an increase of 6% from the previous quarter and 17% higher year-on-year.

 Against the Japanese Yen, the A\$ increased 7% from the previous quarter to average 81.97¥.

■ Against the Korean Won, the A\$ averaged 861.83 $\forall$ , a notable increase of 6% on the previous quarter.

## **Grainfed exports**


■ Australian grainfed exports decreased 14% in the March quarter to 70,968 tonnes swt, down 8.5% on the same quarter last year.

■ Japan remained Australia's largest export market for grainfed beef, with volumes reaching 27,804 tonnes swt, down 23% on the December 2020 quarter.

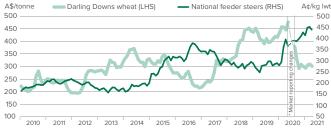
■ Korean exports declined 16% on the previous quarter to 15,939 tonnes swt, however, this was still a 26% increase year-on-year.

■ Exports to China reported a slight decline in the March quarter to 15,269 tonnes swt, down 2.6% on the December quarter and a 22% decline on the same quarter last year.

# **Domestic feeder cattle prices**

■ The Queensland 100-day Grainfed Steer OTH Indicator continued to trade at elevated levels, producing a record March quarter average of 677¢/kg cwt, 2% higher than the December quarter and 10% above year-ago levels. With the ongoing herd rebuild supporting maintained store competition and lowering throughput in the finished market, prices have remained elevated for the start of the year.

■ The National Feeder Steer Indicator averaged 446¢/kg lwt in the March quarter, an increase of 7% on the previous quarter and 27% on year-ago levels. Continued restocker competition aided the indicator's steady increase throughout the quarter.

### **Grain prices**

■ In the March quarter, wheat ex-Darling Downs prices increased slightly by 1% from the previous quarter to average \$305/tonne. This is 33% below March 2020 levels due to the expectation of strong cropping seasons.

■ Barley averaged \$272/tonne, up 4% on the previous quarter but 30% below year-ago levels.
