

Lot feeding brief

Results for the June quarter 2021 feedlot survey

Figure 1: Cattle on feed

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Summary

- The number of cattle on feed increased in the June quarter, reported at 1,173,652 head, a lift of 16.2% on year-ago levels.
- The number of cattle on feed for the June quarter is 11% higher than the five-year quarter average.
- National feedlot capacity remained firm on March 2021 levels at 1,448,085 head demonstrating continued confidence of the lot feeding industry.

From the previous quarter:

- Queensland cattle on feed increased significantly to 708,557 head, a 30% increase for the quarter.
- NSW and Victoria both experienced modest increases in the number of cattle on feed, up 4% and 12.9% to achieve 324,715 and 65,027 head, respectively.
- Cattle on feed numbers in WA fell this quarter, decreasing by 32% to 38,350 head.
- SA remained steady, reporting 37,003 head of cattle on feed, up 1.3%.
- National feedlot utilisation increased to 81% for the June quarter, just above the five-year June quarter average of 77%.

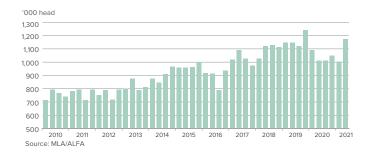


Figure 2: Quarterly grainfed beef exports

Currency

- In the June quarter, the A\$ averaged US77¢, remaining firm on the previous quarter and 18% higher year-on-year.
- Against the Japanese yen, the A\$ increased 2.8% from the March quarter to average 84.27¥ in the June 2021quarter.
- Against the Korean won, the A\$ averaged 863.53₩, a slight increase of 0.2% on the previous quarter.

Grainfed exports

- Australian grainfed exports increased 8% in the June quarter to 77,757 tonnes shipped weight (swt), down 1.7% from the same quarter last year.
- Japan continued to be Australia's largest export market for grainfed beef, with volumes exported reaching 31,815 tonnes swt, down 11% on the June 2020 quarter.
- Korean grainfed exports still surpassed China in volume in the June quarter, up 2.5% on the previous quarter to 16,339 tonnes swt.
- Exports to China also reported a slight increase in the June quarter, up 5.5% on the March quarter to 16,105 tonnes swt, although this was still 17% down on the same quarter last year.

Figure 3: Grainfed cattle turn-off

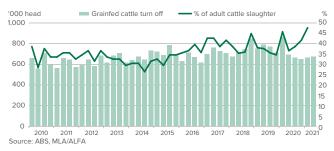


Figure 4: Feed grain and feeder steer prices

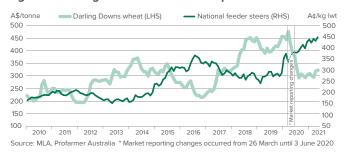


Figure 5: Queensland 100-day Grainfed Steer OTH Indicator



Domestic feeder cattle prices

- The Queensland 100-day Grainfed Steer Over-the-hooks (OTH) Indicator continued to trade at elevated levels, averaging 677¢/kg carcase weight (cwt) in the June quarter. This was 1.5% lower than the record March quarter levels and 9% above yearago levels. With the ongoing herd rebuild maintaining store competition and lowering throughput in the finished market, prices remained strong for the first half of the year.
- The National Feeder Steer Indicator averaged 442¢/kg live weight (lwt) in the June quarter, an increase of 1.8% on the previous quarter. The Indicator held a steady increase through the quarter as a direct result of continuing restocker competition that has propelled it into record territory, up 28% on year-ago levels.

Grain prices

- In the June quarter, wheat ex-Darling Downs prices increased slightly, up 2% from the previous quarter to average \$311/tonne. This price is 27% below June 2020 levels.
- Barley averaged \$285/tonne, up 4.8% on the previous quarter but 21% below year-ago levels.
