Making More From Sheep Webinar Program

Meat & Livestock Australia acknowledges the matching funds provided by the Australian Government to support the research and development detailed in this publication.

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Executive summary

Making more from sheep (MMfS) is the key extension and communication program for MLA and AWI for the Sheep Industry. The delivery of a series of webinars took place from December 2016 through to early 2017 for the sheep industry.

The initial series of webinars were successful in that they;

- 1) were well attended (between 60 and 110 producers attending each webinar),
- 2) rated well with evaluation data indication satisfaction and relevance scores of ~8/10,
- 3) were reasonably cost effective (av. cost per Webinar ~\$3500).

The aim of this project was to continue the delivery of a 12 month national webinar series for sheep producers, covering topics aligned to the online MMfS manual, providing participants with fundamental information to support practice change and increase their productivity and profitability.

Success in achieving milestones would be best summarised as follows:

- 1. The average attendance for webinars to date is 102 per webinar. Registrations for the series are at a total of 1077. The number of attendees and registrations increased at each milestone date.
- 2. The satisfaction and value ratings are averaging 4.2 and 4.0 out of 5 respectively.
- 3. 92% of attendees are saying that they would recommended the webinar series to another producer.
- 4. 36% of attendees said they will make a practice change after listening to the webinars
- 5. All webinars have subsequently been hosted on the MLA website. Holmes Sackett has not been privy to the number of times these webinars have been watched off the MLA website.
- 6. The total cost of delivery came to \$110,993.83. Per producer attending the webinars (2459 in total) this comes to a cost of delivery of \$45.15.

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1 Background

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2 Project objectives

To coordinate the delivery and management of a minimum of two sheep webinars a month over the next 12 months aligned to the MMfS online manual.

3 Results

3.1 Success in meeting the milestones

The webinar series commenced on the 28th of September, 3 months later than originally planned.

In response to the late start the scheduling of webinars has been accelerated to ensure that a minimum of 24 webinars will be achieved before the 30th June 2018.

Webinar registrations at Milestone 2, 3, 4 and 5 are outlined in Table 1.

The webinars delivered to date and the monitoring and evaluation data are summarised in Table 2.

Some examples of the positive and negative qualitative feedback received on each webinar are captured in Table 3.

In Milestone 4 report there were 1014 producers registered. In the current report there are 1077 producers registered, an increase of 58 (6%) (Table 1). The largest increases by number have come from NSW and Victoria, with substantial % increases in South Australia, Queensland and Western Australia, off a low base.

By adjusting the settings on the webinar platform the limit on the capacity of only 1000 registrants was removed. This will allow registration to continue to grow.

The increase in registrations we believe has come through targeting the MMfS attendance database via email by Holmes Sackett and through the additional promotional work done by MLA over the last few webinars.

4 Conclusions/recommendations

4.1 Summary

The demand for these webinars is strong and growing. Topic and date seem to influence live attendance, however outside the pre-Christmas period attendances were strong. Subsequent series should avoid this period if possible.

The number of downloads of the recorded webinars that are hosted on the MLA website is not available to Holmes Sackett.

4.2 Financial Reconciliation

The coordination and deliverer fees for the seminars have been delivered to the budget outlined in the contract, totalling \$105,574.

Budgeted expenses were \$5026. The total actual expenses was \$5419.83. The extra has not been charged.
