Key drivers to deliver excellence in eating quality

- **Use premium commodities for nutrition:** Cattle receive high-quality feed – including a steam-flaked barley-based ration to improve digestibility.
- **Well-trained staff for low-stress handling:** Daily cattle checks and calm handling reduces stress and improves eating quality outcomes.
- **Effective backgrounding program before feedlot entry:** A two-week introduction program with soft feeding and pasture rotation helps cattle transition smoothly into the feedlot, minimizing stress.

- **Consistent management practices:** Regular weighing, careful mob management and set stocking help maintain stable performance and consistent MSA results, year after year.
- **Selecting steers for calm temperament:** Calm cattle reduce stress across the mob – minimizing risks like dark cutting while improving weight gain and overall carcass quality.
- **Data-driven decision making:** Collecting and reviewing carcass feedback and weight data enables early intervention, continuous improvement and informed management decisions.

Key drivers to deliver excellence in eating quality

- **Maintain good soil health:** Barry emphasizes biologically active soil to ensure plants are minerally rich plants – supporting cattle to express their genetic potential.
- **Pasture diversity:** Uses a multi-species pasture mix (clovers, chicory, phalaris, lucerne) and rotates steers weekly to allow pasture recovery and ensure consistent high-quality feed.
- **Cull for temperament:** Selecting bulls with good temperament and low birth weight while spending time with cattle during weaning and fattening reduces stress. This improves safety and contributes to better eating quality.
