Live export statistics

This edition of LiveLink includes the latest trends in Australian live export trade statistics and prices. Please note that all export data over the past nine months may later be revised.

For the January to July period, **live cattle exports** (feeder, slaughter, breeder) declined 16% on the same time last year – at just over 700,800 head (ABS, DAWR).

To **Indonesia**, live cattle exports (feeder & slaughter) for the January to July period totalled 345,513 head – easing 15% on the corresponding period the year prior. So far in August, greater Jakarta wet market prices have remained stable, at around IDR 115,000-120,000/kg, with imported cattle prices following a similar trend (IDR 42,000-42,500/kg lwt). Reports suggest Indonesian feedlots have recently started to apply for trimester three (September-December) import permits – of which are likely to reach up to 200,000 head – taking the 2016 total to 600,000 head.

Reduced northern cattle availability and strong buyer competition in the physical markets saw live export indicators continue to move higher in July. **Feeder steers** delivered to **Darwin** averaged 335¢, up 11¢ on the month prior – with prices continuing to strengthen in the first two weeks of August – reaching as high as 345¢/kg lwt. **Feeder steers** delivered to **Townsville** reached a top of 315¢ in July – 9¢/kg lwt dearer than the June average.

Data specifications

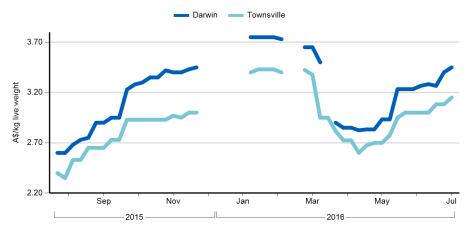
Due to the timing of live export trade data being released, both Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) and Department of Agriculture and Water Resources (DAWR) data is used in this report. The most recent month and, at times, second most recent month trade data comes from DAWR. This data is then updated when ABS data is released.

* In October 2015, the ABS did not disclose feeder and slaughter cattle trade data to Vietnam, China and Japan. For this month, individual country shipments have been estimated by MLA. In addition, trade data by individual port was also not disclosed in October 2015 – this data is aggregated under "Unknown" port.

** DAWR does not report on individual ports. Port data is updated when released by the ABS.

All pricing data is collected by Meat and Livestock Australia from a range of sources.

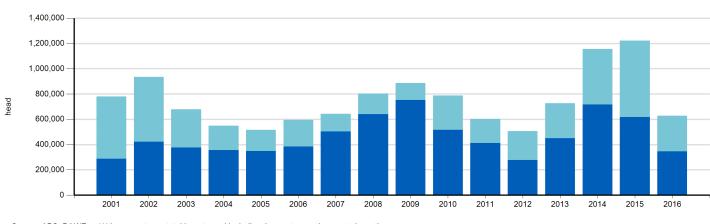
Figure 2 Live export feeder cattle prices

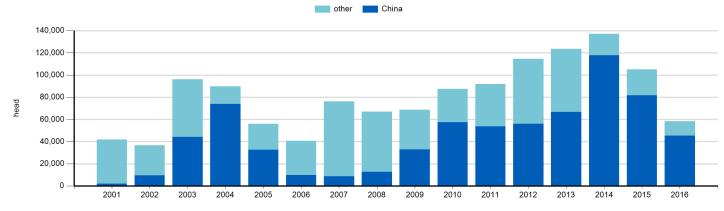

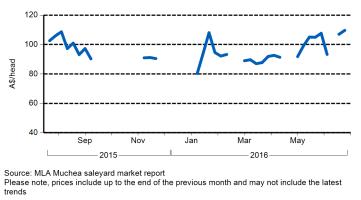

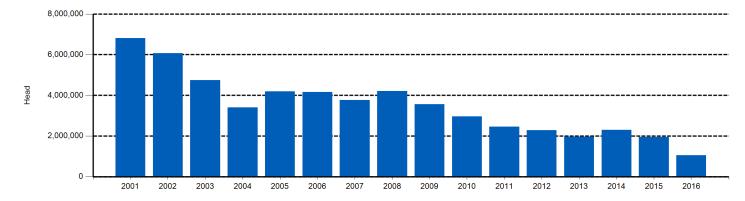


Figure 7 Sheep exports***

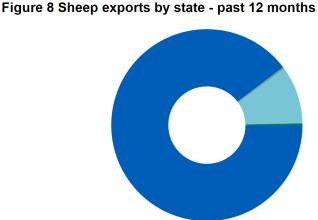

For the January to July period, Australian sheep exports lowered marginally (1%) on the same time the year prior - with just short of 1.06 million head shipped. Unsurprisingly, live sheep exports to Kuwait continued as the number one destination up 39%, to 347,440 head - however shipments to Qatar over-doubled on the corresponding period the year prior, at 308,000 head.

Shipments to the UAE has continued the downward trend recorded in the months prior - with exports so far this season decreasing 58% year-on-year, to 94,848 head. Encouragingly, shipments to both Jordan & Israel both recorded significant improvements at the conclusion of the January to July period - gaining 44% and 105%, to 132,851 head and 80,970 head, respectively.

As a result of the removal of the import subsidy, so far in 2016 (January to July) there have been no live shipments to Bahrain- of which for the corresponding period the year prior, totalled 230,000 head.

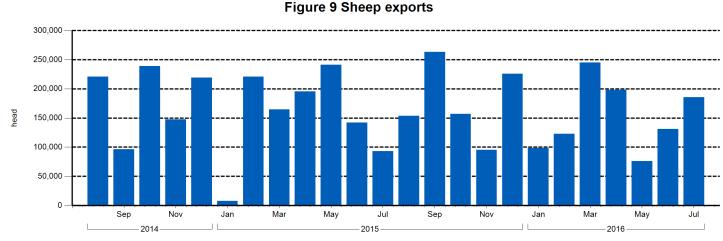

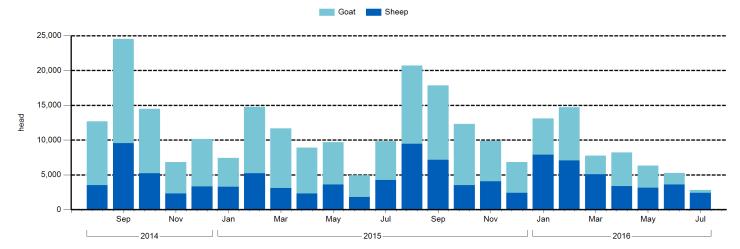


Figure 10 Goat and sheep exports to Malaysia & Singapore

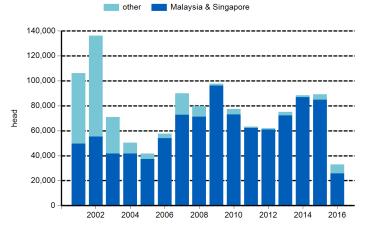
So far this year (January to July), total live goat exports have declined 28% year-on-year, to 33,050 head. Exports to **Malaysia** declined significantly in July (41%), taking shipments so far this year to just over 25,600 head.

Interestingly, live goat exports to the **UAE** gained notable momentum in July – with shipments increasing to 5,361 head so far this year - up from just 1,492 head recorded the same time year prior (DAWR).

Record rangeland goat prices so far this year (January to July), as a result of reduced supplies and strong processor demand, have seen a slowdown in Malaysian imports— with shortfalls in importer sentiment for goats offset by higher live sheep exports in 2016 (up 38% year-on-year, to 32,501 head).

Additionally, in July, eastern states goat slaughter reached just shy of 82,600 head – up 16% on the same time last year (NLRS).
