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Weather outlook

As highlighted in the Bureau of Meteorology's (BOM) latest three month weather outlook, rainfall is likely to exceed average levels in large parts of northern NT and northwest WA, while conditions in southern Queensland and central Australia are forecast to be drier than average for the February to April period.

Across the Top End, regions surrounding **Katherine** have a 75% chance of exceeding average rainfall for the outlook period – with a similar scenario expected in western regions spanning from **Broome** to **Newman**.

Newcastle Waters has close to a 70% chance of receiving above-average showers, while the outlook for **Charters Towers** and **Georgetown** is roughly neutral.

Live exports

With the northern wet season continuing to have a tightening effect on supplies throughout December and into January, most indicators started the new year dearer when compared to the same time last year. In the first week of February, **feeder steers** delivered to **Darwin** were firm, averaging 378¢, while increased availability in eastern areas resulted in those delivered to **Townsville** easing to 353¢/kg.

In the first week of February, as a result of the continued judicial review surrounding animal health and zonal imports, the Indonesian government have delayed reviews relating to current ruminant importation restrictions – with no official revisions being made in the short term. Currently, wet market fresh beef prices in the **Greater Jakarta** region are stable at IDR 110,000-120,000/kg, while buffalo meat is reported to range between IDR 75,000-100,000/kg – with demand anticipated to rise over the upcoming Ramadhan period.

At the conclusion of 2016, calendar year **total Australian live feeder and cattle exports** declined 16% on the year prior, at 1.02 million head shipped – with exports to **Indonesia** back 3% to just over 600,700 head (ABS).

Saleyard indicators

Availability throughout northern markets has remained seasonally restrained so far this year, as extreme weather conditions have contributed to fluctuating supply levels and buyer uncertainty in a number of key producing regions.

Northern Queensland average weekly yardings declined 40% on what was recorded the year prior – with lighter offerings at both **Emerald** and **CQLX Gracemere** contributing to the decline. In January, all major **North Queensland saleyard indicators** strengthened year-on-year – with some categories trending as much as 50¢/kg lwt dearer. The **restocker** and **medium** steer indicators lifted 34¢ and 26¢, to 354¢ and 307¢/kg lwt, respectively.

Over-the-hook indicators and slaughter

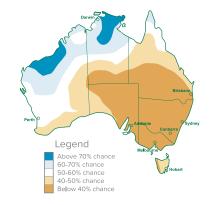
In January, **north Queensland average weekly cattle slaughter** declined 25% year-on-year, to 5,251 head – as extreme weather conditions prolonged plant closures into February, with tighter availability and higher average prices also having an effect.

Despite easing marginally this week (17th February) and with some contributors only recently returning to quote, **north Queensland over-the-hook indicators** continued to trend dearer when compared to the same time last year – with all major categories up more than 20¢/kg cwt. In the second week of February, **trade** and **heavy steer** indicators averaged 536¢ and 546¢, respectively, while the **medium cow** indicator settled at 468¢/kg cwt.

Last week (9th February), the **US imported 90CL beef** indicator averaged 203US¢/lb CIF (586A¢/kg) – up 1US¢ on what was recorded the week prior, and 9US¢/lb dearer year-on-year. Reports suggest that imported beef prices remain notably firm on limited spot supplies at present – with higher offering prices from overseas packers.

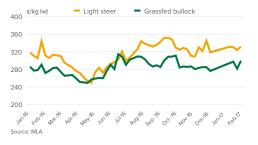
Chance of exceeding the median rainfall Feb – Apr 2017
